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## EXECUTIVE REPORT

Ka tuku mihi mātou a Bowls Aotearoa ki a koutou katoa.

On behalf of Tony Lepper (Bowls New Zealand Board Chair) and myself, it is our pleasure to present the 2023 Annual Report., a 12 month period that saw our communities navigate out of COVID-19, only for the North Island to be faced with some of the worst weather Aotearoa has seen in many years.

The resilience of, and support for, our communities was evident in how our bowling clubs rallied behind communities in the Gisborne and Hawkes Bay regions following Cyclone Gabrielle. Despite many club members having to play bowls on wet greens and managing leaking clubrooms, 2022/2023 nevertheless evidenced some great growth in our game and community.

### **Bowling Clubs - Membership & Participation**

Our annual census of membership and participation numbers reflects the calendar year to 31 December 2022. Details to these numbers can be found later in this report. The highlights though as evidenced by the table below, show playing membership up 3.6% on prior year. What was especially encouraging was first year membership (at 1789) is the highest it has been in 20 years. This is a direct consequence of some of the great work done by many of our clubs with twilight (social) bowls leagues. Twilight bowls members have grown to 13,272 which is half the number that Bowls NZ separately recorded as full playing members.

Casual participation within bowling clubs is quickly returning to pre-COVID-19 numbers, with the corporate market supporting many clubs financially during the summer months of 2022.

#### **National Events**

Our Summerset national events continue to attract strong interest from around the country. Numbers were at 15 year highs as bowlers emerged from the COVID-19 hibernation ready to contest events across the North and South Island.

The Summerset Singles and Pairs were played in a very wet Auckland. Such was the weather that on a number of days all games were moved from grass greens to carpet (artificial) greens. To the credit of the players, and with the excellent support of the local clubs, 99% of games were able to be played and the event was completed to schedule. The belief that carpet greens are inferior to grass greens was truly tested during this event so I am pleased to say that the carpet greens passed the test. 1580 individuals attended the 2023 Summerset Nationals (Singles, Pairs, Fours and Mixed Pairs), a significant increase on the 563 that attended five years ago.

In what proved to be a busy national calendar, we found new champions in Interclub, Intercentre, Bowls3Five, Rangatahi, Singles, Pairs, Fours and Mixed Pairs. These events were delivered by clubs

in Auckland, Hawkes Bay, Wellington, Canterbury, and Central Otago. Our thanks to all the clubs and regions for their support in 2022/2023.

#### **Internationals**

Our Blackjacks returned to the international arena in what proved to be a very busy 12 months. Three medals in the Birmingham Commonwealth Games were an acceptable return considering the COVID-19 impacted build-up, and the somewhat foreign nature of the 10-11 second English greens. Congratulations to the Blackjacks women (Katelyn Inch, Selina Goddard, Nicole Toomey, Tayla Bruce, and Val Smith) for showing the rest of New Zealand, on primetime TV, how entertaining our game can be.

The World Champion of Champion Singles was contested at the Naenae Bowling Club in Wellington, with our own Tayla Bruce emerging as World Champion.

In March of 2023, the Blackjacks attended a multinations event in Australia, enjoying success in a number of disciplines. Our hope is that this preparation serves us well for later in the year at the 2023 World Championship (also in Australia).

Our vision impaired bowlers performed incredibly well at the 2023 Blind World Championship, collecting a record haul of five medals. Katelyn Inch and Andrew Kelly contested the World Indoor Singles championship in May, both returning home with silver medals.

And finally on the international scene, it was Bowls New Zealand's pleasure to host the inaugural Oceania Challenge in April 2023 at the Blockhouse Bay Bowling Club in Auckland. With nine nations, including a NZ U26 selection and an Aotearoa Māori bowls team, the event proved a huge success that will be repeated.

Our thanks to all our international players and the management team for their professionalism, energy and commitment these past 12 months.

### **Operational Matters**

There are 465 active bowling clubs in Aotearoa, along with 27 regions. Whilst we saw four small clubs 'retire' in 2023, we also had the pleasure of welcoming two new bowling clubs.

Bowls New Zealand's primary role is to support bowling clubs with their delivery into local communities. Support takes many forms, be that the promotion of twilight bowls, event pathways, facility improvements or assisting with judicial matters.

Our BowlsHub solution has now been piloted in a couple of northern centres and has already proven to be a great database tool and competition management solution. We look forward to extending BowlsHub to 12 centres in 2024 and piloting a grading (levels) feature.

One initiative we are particularly proud of is our ability to produce and broadcast a number of bowls events around the country. There has been in excess of 30 events and 60 days of 'live' bowls coverage over the past 12 months. Testament to the improving quality of our 'in-house' production is Sky Sport taking our feed 'as is' and promoting it on their sports network.

Our thanks to the many umpires, coaches and volunteers that deliver bowls into our communities.

#### **Finances and Partnerships**

The bowls community has been supported by several national and community partners. For Bowls New Zealand this includes Summerset Retirement Villages, Dynasty Apparel, Prebble Seeds, Apex Insurance, Field Turf NZ, NZCT, Lion Foundation, Aotearoa Gaming Trust, Four Winds, Sport NZ and High Performance Sport NZ. Your support of Bowls New Zealand and the wider bowls community is sincerely appreciated.

In 2023, Bowls New Zealand recorded a \$ 217,979 deficit which was \$42,021 improved on a budgeted deficit of \$260,000. The deficit was budgeted to reflect our support of clubs and the community as we moved out of COVID-19, along with additional investment in our broadcast and BowlsHub opportunities. The other major factor was our support of the international programme with a Commonwealth Games, Multi-nations and world bowls events all falling in the same 12 months.

The Bowls New Zealand reserves remain healthy with approximately \$1.2 million available in liquid assets.

### GOVERNANCE



Bowls New Zealand's governance focus for the past 12 months has been the delivery of a new strategic plan and supporting the organisation in a post COVID-19 era.

The deficit budget was authorised so we could support clubs and communities that had fallen on tough times due to COVID-19 and more recently the appalling weather systems that have hit Aotearoa.

The need to support an intensive 12 months of international (world) bowls was also viewed as a fitting use of Balance Sheet reserves.

In September of 2022 the board supported the opportunity to be part of Sport NZ's 'Strengthen and Adapt' programme to accelerate the delivery of one of our key strategic priorities. That project is the BowlsHub database and competition management solution, and we are pleased to report that Sport NZ has committed \$450,000 to this initiative for the next three years.

In May of 2023, the Board and management team set aside a day to review and draft a strategic and operational plan for the next three years (to 2026). This plan has been developed so that Bowls New Zealand can guide future growth and capacity within the bowls community.

A healthy discussion occurred at this strategy meeting on the purpose of Bowls New Zealand.

The last 100+ years would suggest Bowls New Zealand's focus is on the sport of bowls, but with clubs becoming increasingly diverse in their community offering, our future focus is also on healthy bowling clubs. The Bowls NZ Board and management subsequently agreeing that the purpose of Bowls New Zealand is: 'To deliver a sport that is enjoyable, entertaining, and accessible to all New Zealanders AND to support and grow vibrant and healthy bowling clubs within our communities'.

The strategy session agreed a number of priorities including BowlsHub, broadcast, twilight bowls, and a commitment to diversity and inclusion in our game and community.

# STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Bowls New Zealand Incorporated. For the year ended 30 June 2023

#### 1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **BASIS OF PREPARATION**

The reporting entity is Bowls New Zealand Incorporated ("Bowls NZ"). Bowls NZ is domiciled in New Zealand and is an incorporated society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. Bowls NZ as an incorporated society is not required to report under the Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") and other applicable financial reporting standards as appropriate that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-For-Profit entities. However, it has chosen to voluntarily adopt the majority of these standards in the preparation of these special purpose financial statements as it transitions towards full implementation, with the exception of the non-presentation of a cashflow statement and key management personnel disclosures, as well as not adopting PBE FRS 48 Service Performance Reporting.

Bowls NZ is a public benefit not-for-profit entity and is eligible to apply Tier 2 Not-For-Profit PBE IPSAS standards on the basis that it does not have public accountability and it is not defined as large. The Board has elected to report consistent with Tier 2 Not-For-Profit PBE Accounting Standards with the exception of the above items, and in doing so has taken advantage of all applicable Reduced Disclosure Regime ("RDR") disclosure concessions.

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These financial statements has been prepared on the basis of historical cost, as modified by the fair value measurement of non-derivative financial instruments, and on a going concern basis.

The board considers that the accounting policies adopted in these special purpose financial statements are appropriate to give the users of the financial statements meaningful information about the performance and position of the organisation for the current year.

The policies adoped are the same as the prior year. PBE IPSAS 41: Financial Instruments was adoped in the 2023 financial year but had no effect on the measurement of financial instruments in the financial statements.

#### **SPECIFIC ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

### (A). REVENUE

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to Bowls NZ and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognised.

# REVENUE FROM NON-EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

# **DONATIONS**

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt and include donations from the general public or donations received for specific programmes. In kind services, including volunteer time are not recorded as revenue or expense.

# **GRANT REVENUE**

Grant revenue includes grants given by charitable organisations, philanthropic organisations and businesses. Grant revenue is recognised when received unless there is a clear use or return condition. In this case, revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant has been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled.

# REVENUE FROM EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

### SPONSORSHIP INCOME

Funds received from sponsors are recognised as revenue when the terms of the relevant sponsorship agreement have been met.

### **MEMBERSHIP FEES**

Annual fees and subscriptions from bowls clubs are recognised in revenue evenly over the membership period.

### **EVENT INCOME**

Entrance fees for functions and events are deferred initially and recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place. Related expenses are recognised as prepayments until the events occur.

# INTEREST AND DIVIDEND INCOME

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method. Dividend income is recognised when the dividend is declared.

# (B). FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when Bowls NZ becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

# STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Bowls New Zealand Incorporated. For the year ended 30 June 2023

Bowls NZ derecognises a financial asset or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets when the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or are waived, or Bowls NZ has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party; and either:

- Bowls NZ has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- Bowls NZ has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset

#### **FINANCIAL ASSETS**

Financial assets within the scope of PBE IPSAS 41 Financial Instruments: They are classified as financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, at amortised cost. The classifications of the financial assets are determined at initial recognition.

#### **FINANCIAL ASSETS AT AMORTISED COST**

Bowls NZ's financial assets recorded at amortised cost include: cash and cash equivalents, short-term investments, receivables from non-exchange transactions and exchange transactions.

#### FINANCIAL ASSETS AT FAIR VALUE THROUGH SURPLUS OR DEFICIT

Bowls NZ's equity investments and funds invested in and managed by Jarden Investments fall into this category of financial instruments. These financial instruments are recognised at fair value at balance date. Changes in fair value are recognised through surplus or deficit each year.

#### **IMPAIRMENT OF FINANCIAL ASSETS**

Bowls NZ assesses at the end of reporting date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied for each category of financial assets. Where an impairment is identified, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced and the loss is recognised in the surplus or deficit for the reporting period.

# FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

Bowls NZ's financial liabilities include trade and other payables (excluding GST and PAYE), employee entitlements and deferred income (in respect to grants whose conditions are yet to be complied with). All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value through surplus or deficit) and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### (C). CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

### (D). SHORT TERM INVESTMENTS

Short term investments comprise term deposits which have a term of greater than three months and less than 12 months and therefore do not fall into the category of cash and cash equivalents.

# (E). INVENTORIES

Inventories held are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### (F). PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Where an asset is acquired through a non-exchange transaction, its cost is measured at its fair value as at the date of acquisition.

# (F). PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Where an asset is acquired through a non-exchange transaction, its cost is measured at its fair value as at the date of acquisition.

Depreciation is charged on a straight line or diminishing value basis over the useful life of the asset. Depreciation is charged at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the asset less any estimated residual value over its remaining useful life:

- Building Improvements 17%
- Office Equipment 20% to 67%
- Vehicles 30% DV

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and are adjusted if there is a change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits or service potential embodied in the asset.

#### (G). GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except for receivables and payables, which are stated with the amount of GST included. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

#### (H). INCOME TAX

Bowls NZ is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions as an amateur sports promotor under section CW 46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

#### (I). LEASES

Payments on operating lease agreements, where the lessor retains substantially all the risk and rewards of ownership of an asset, are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Payments on finance lease agreements, where the lessee retains substantially the risk and rewards of ownership of an asset, are capitalised. The asset and the corresponding liability are recorded at inception at the fair value of the leased asset.

Interest charges under finance leases are apportioned over the terms of the respective leases. Capitalised leased assets are depreciated over their expected useful lives in accordance with rates established for similar assets.

#### (J). EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Wages, salaries, annual leave and sick leave.

Liabilities for wages and salaries, annual leave and accumulating sick leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

## (K). SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The preparation of Bowls NZ's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

# JUDGEMENTS

In the process of applying Bowls NZ's accounting policies, management has made the following judgements, which have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements:

## **OPERATING LEASE COMMITMENTS**

Bowls NZ has entered into a number of operating leases.

Bowls NZ has determined, based on an evaluation of the terms and conditions of the arrangements, such as the lease term not constituting a substantial portion of the economic life of the property, that it does not retain all the significant risks and rewards of ownership of these properties and accounts for the contracts as operating leases.

## **ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS**

There are no key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.


